he Forestry Technician course at Algonquin College in Pembroke, Ontario is a one year condensed course that can be very demanding but also very rewarding says a former graduate of the program.

In her own words, Nicole Bergevin says: "The year at Algonquin was a new, but not quiet novel, experience for me. Having previously spent four years in the post secondary system at university I thought I knew what to expect when I came to Algonquin College last September. How wrong was I! This course has given us the skills to confidently enter the work force and taught us that there is no hill too high to climb if we just put our minds to it.
