
Hieroglyphic Icons

Seven original clans of the Anishinaabe:






Layout

You can use these icons in any of the Algonquin colours from the Visual Identity Standards, as long as they meet the 70% contrast accessability requirements.

Using them alone or as part of a series is acceptable, but do not try and re-create the original hieroglyphic pattern.

Ensure there is a good amount of space left between the icons, so they do not appear to be merged as one.






Combining Icon Types

You can combine icon types into the same layout (animals, fire and boats).

Do not create a larger culmulative illustration out of the icons. You cannot, for example, but the boats in an illustrated river. They are to be used as supporting graphical elements.



Patterns

You can use a large amount of icons to create a pattern or texture on an artboard. These can be the feature design, or they can be a background elements supporting another design.

If you are using a large pattern of icons, do not repeate any icons until you have at least one of each. Two of the same icons cannot be placed next to each other. These rules apply to a single type or all combined types of icons.
